2. Berry Good for You and Fido, Too

Dr. Gary Stoner, from the University of Ohio has released some amazing research that can have your and your pet's mouths watering and could keep you both in "berry" good health.

While more research is still underway, what has been established is that black raspberries are loaded with powerful nutrients and phytochemicals that have properties needed to aid in cancer prevention. In fact, many doctors today recommend that their cancer patients add black raspberries to their diets before and during chemotherapy.

So, what's up with raspberries anyway? Within the tiny berry, which is native to North America, is a powerful mix of compounds called ellagitannins. While ellagitannins can also be found in grapes, blackberries, blueberries, strawberries and some types of nuts, raspberries have the highest levels of this powerful biological weapon for your health. In fact, black raspberries seem to be the highest in antioxidants. When compared to other berries, black raspberries were found to be as much as 40% higher. Further, the anthocyanis, which gives the black raspberry its black pigment, provides vitamins A, C,

E, folic acid, calcium, and ferulic acid.

In a recent study, rats fed black raspberries had 80% fewer malignant tumors in comparison to those who did not have a diet with black raspberries. Therefore, it is believed black raspberries can help aid in the prevention and development of certain cancers. During the current study, researchers looked at the black raspberry's ability to stop onset of certain cancers and, further, to stop progression of precancerous cells. If that isn't enough to have you and Fido adding black raspberries as a powerful weapon to your daily diet regiment, black raspberries have an added benefit as they also have an antibacterial and anti-viral agent to boot.

Dr. Stoner stated in an interview that he is aware that fresh black raspberries can be very expensive and often hard to find. On the other hand, freeze-dried black raspberries have as much nutritional content as their fresh counterparts do. Still, these may also be hard to find. Nonetheless, many feel this is about to change.

The Progressive benefit has only been offered since early September, so it's too early to tell if the cost of offering it will be offset by an increase in more auto insurance sales.
