

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2. Smile

Periodontal disease is one of the most common diseases, affecting 50 to 80 percent of all dogs. While tooth and gum disease can affect your pooch's pearly white smile, it can also have a dangerous effect on his/her overall heath when left untreated. Food particles and bacteria, which formulate in and around the gum line, begin as a film. It then hardens into what is called plaque. If the buildup is not removed, pockets begin to form that separate the gum from the tooth and attract more bacteria growth. The bacteria can then penetrate into the blood stream and travel to your pet's major organs such as the heart, liver and kidneys.

Telltale Signs

While it may be difficult to for you to tell that your pooch is having dental problems, your vet can examine your pet's mouth and assess any signs of disease. Some telltale signs you can look for are:

- A change in eating habits
- Red, swollen gums
- Bleeding gums
- Foul breath
- Pawing at the mouth
- Brownish colored saliva
- Nasal discharge
- Facial swelling

While pet owners can have their pet's teeth cleaned by their vet, and should, one of the most effective ways to help prevent this disease is daily brushing. While brushing your pet's teeth can be a hard task, if started at an early age it can help tremendously. However, even older pets can be taught to allow their owners to brush their teeth. Here are some things to put the balance in your favor. First, never use human toothpaste on your pet. It is loaded with fluoride. While a human can understand not to swallow the toothpaste, your pet will not and this can be highly toxic. Use pet toothpaste; introduce the paste and brushing slowly. This will allow you and your pet to get accustomed to this daily routine. There are several styles of brushes to choose from, so try to pick one that works best for you and your pet, taking into account the size of your pet's mouth. One tip is to press the paste into the bristles of the brush. This will help prevent the paste from being licked off the brush by the pet and thus be more effective.
