

This year, June 20 is Take Your Dog to Work Day. More and more companies are allowing dogs in the workplace every day, not just one day of the year. A recent survey by Dogster and Simply Hired found over 400 dog-friendly companies. Some are well known, such as Amazon, Google and Ben & Jerry's. However, the majority are small companies of less than 50 employees with California having the most dog-friendly employers. When it comes to most pet stores, humane societies, groomers and vet offices, dog friendly appears to come with the territory, while some real estate offices and retail outlets litter the list.

Lymphoma accounts for 10-20% of all cancers in dogs. No breed seems to be immune to this deadly disease; however, there are some breeds that are more at risk than others. These include Rottweilers, German Shepherds, Golden Retrievers, Basset Hounds and Scottish Terriers.

Lymphoma is a cancer that targets the lymphoid system. Your pet's lymphoid system is a vital part of the immune system, which sets up a defense against viruses and bacteria. Now, what was originally tested for humans on dogs is coming full circle to help man's best friend fight cancer. Washington State University will embark on the world's largest transplant program for dogs this summer.

Similar to what humans receive in a bone marrow transplant, the university will begin offering a procedure for canines to help fend off cancer. In the past, bone marrow transplants were limited to a few private-practice veterinarians. It has never before been offered in a veterinary hospital setting such as the planned transplant clinic.

Bone marrow transplantations in humans were originally perfected using approximately 2,000 dogs, with the consent of their owners, in clinical trials. By taking what they helped to build in a laboratory for people, this program gives back to the canine community.

The program provides pet owners with another option for their pets suffering from cancer. While it's not a cure, the treatment will extend lives. Nonetheless, this does not go without a large price tag, with treatment ranging from \$15,000 to \$20,000. While many pet owners welcome this procedure, others feel the procedure would subject the pet to a painful, prolonged life. Doctors believe this is a more effective treatment option, but will have additional data once the transplants begin.
