2. ALD

ALD

Acral lick dermatitis (ALD), also known as lick granuloma is a condition whereby the pet licks excessively. Usually this is around or on the front paws or legs. At first this might seem like the pet is simply grooming himself or herself. However, the precipitant licking can result in skin irration, inflammation, itchy, red and even ulcerated areas. To add to this no win equation, the more licking they do, the more likely the area will not heal. Moisture produced by the excessive licking can cause bacteria, which in turn causes the skin to itch making the pet want to lick all the more. This becomes a vicious cycle for your pet.

Your vet will need to run tests to make sure another condition is not masquerading as ALD. X-rays, blood tests, cultures and even biopsies may be needed to rule out such things as: allergies, fungal infections, arthritis, tumors, skin mites or low levels of thyroid just to name a few.

While any breed or size of dog can develop ALD, it is more commonly found in larger breeds. Some prescribe to the theory that the dog's excessive licking can help release endorphins, which in turn gives the dog a sense of well-being. ALD, is thought to be more of a psychological condition rather than a physical one.

If your pet is diagnosed with ALD, your vet can help you plan some lifestyle changes for your pet. Below are just a few things that may need to be looked into and adjusted to help your pet.

- Healthy diet
- Exercise
- Entertainment
- Scheduled feedings
- Conflict management, this can be anything from separation anxiety, problems with another pet in your household, long periods confinement or boredom.

Along with the above your veterinarian will more then likely treat the area to help in healing process. Some may need to be fitted with what is called an Elizabethan collar to stop the licking cycle and/or medications.
